Sesshu, artist of the Muromachi period, one of the greatest masters of the Japanese art of sumi-e, monochrome ink painting. He adapted Chinese models to Japanese artistic ideals and aesthetic sensibilities. Sesshu painted landscapes, Zen Buddhist pictures, and screens decorated with flowers and birds and other animals.

The historical crisis forced Kuniyoshi, an émigré Japanese with a distinguished career in American art, to rethink his pictorial strategies and to confront questions of loyalty, assimilation, national and racial identity that he had carefully avoided in his prewar art.

Japanese Painting And National Identity
Commonly confused with calligraphy is the art form of sumi-e (墨絵), literally meaning 'ink painting', which is the art of painting a scene or object using diluted black ink. Painting has been an art in Japan for a very long time: the brush is a traditional writing and painting tool, and the extension of that to its use as an artist's tool was probably natural.

Rather, they identified solely based on their own national origins (Chinese, Japanese, Korean, etc.). But building on the Civil Rights Movement's focus on racial/ethnic solidarity and group consciousness, the pan-Asian identity of "Asian Americans" eventually emerged, emphasizing shared experiences and commonalities of having Asian ancestry.

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
